



## From Sue's Geneology files:

William (*Gulielmus*) Matthew Corcoran from Kildare, Ireland was a former Rockford resident and is also the great-great grandfather of Jan Carlson Simone, a Cherry Valley resident. She shared the details surrounding the untimely death of her great-great grandfather outside a Rockford beer garden in 1871.

The incident occurred on an early August Sunday afternoon in 1871 at Kaufmann's Beer Garden located at the corner of West State St and Church St just south of the then Rockford city limits. Three young gentlemen stopped in and consumed a large amount of alcohol in about an hour. It wasn't mentioned how long William Corcoran had been sitting at a table just outside or how much he had to drink. Accounts of the story say that Corcoran, who may have been "overserved" shouted something at the boys. Two of them, CH Stevens and Charles Brown, ignored him but Dennis Hayes, decided that he was being specifically targeted and responded. One thing led to another and a fight ensued. In the end, Corcoran was badly beaten and removed to his home where doctors agreed nothing could be done. William passed away early on Monday morning, leaving a pregnant wife and four small children. The baby was named William Michael Cororan.

As for killer, he took off but did not resist arrest when the sheriff found him. The sad part about this story is that Dennis, who most of his life was spent in different jails, never had to go to jail for killing Corcoran. Dennis Hayes died in 1896. Notice in Mrs. Corcoran's obituary, Dennis Hayes, is mentioned one more time. Below you can read Cororan's obituary, Dennis Hayes is mentioned one final time in this record.

#### CATHERINE CORCORAN DEAD.

Widow of the Victim of Dennis Hayes Passes Away.


Mrs. Catherine Corcoran passed away at her home, 411 South Horsman street, at 3 o'clock this morning, after suffering from a cancerous tumor of the stomach since last June.

Mrs. Corcoran was born April 18, 1837, in Castle Dermot, County Kildare, Ireland, her maiden name being Catherine Doyle. She received her education in Kildare abbey, and in 1862 she was married to Wm. Corcoran, who was murdered in South Rockford in 1871 by the late Dennis Hayes. In 1867 Mr. and Mrs. Corcoran came to this country, settling in Rutland, Vt. In 1869 they moved to Rockford, and Mrs. Corcoran devoted herself to the bringing up of her five children.

In 1847 Mrs. Corcoran, when a young girl, received the pledge of total abstinence from Rev. Father Matthew, the famous temperance advocate, and she retained that pledge to the last, being one of the foremost temperance workers in the city. She was a consistent member of St. Mary's Catholic church and belonged to the Altar and Rosary society.

The children are Mrs. Mary Long of Kansas City, Christopher Corcoran of Oregon, Ill., and Michael, William and Miss Bride Corcoran of this city. The funeral services will be held

The funeral services will be held Wednesday morning from St. Mary's church.

**IDOT construction** on route 20 between the mall and east towards Belvidere will begin soon. This construction will include some changes in front of the CV cemetery.

\*There will now possibly be only two entry/exits to and from the cemetery.

\*IDOT will be putting a frontage road in front of the cemetery which will lead to two loops into and around the sides and back of the cemetery. The cemetery will still be responsible for the internal roads.

\*Due to the cemetery being at near compacity, the cemetery board has started a **"Scatter Garden"** which will be located at the northeast back area of the cemetery.

The CV cemetery is in need of donations for road improvements, completion of the scatter garden and maintenance in general. Lawn Care by Walter has been a friend of the cemetery with their help on the scatter garden construction.
