We are grateful for the individuals who have expressed a willingness to ensure that the Museum will be there for years to come. I hope they will introduce themselves in the next newsletter. Although the museum is not currently having visitors because of the pandemic, I hope we will be able to be open this spring.

My Beginnings with C.V Historical Society

In the summer of 1998 I was at the Belvidere Moose Club with some old friends. Lyle Wilt said he had something to tell me about that he thought I would enjoy. This was my introduction to the Cherry Valley Historical Society. He was certainly right, I joined and enjoyed it for many years (22 in fact). It had already been in progress since 1995. Back then a large number of former CV folks came to the meetings. Besides working to preserve pieces of Cherry Valley history, stories were shared, and trips to visit other historical locations were all part of the agenda.

The reason for having this society was to preserve the artifacts that people gave us. Many items are very old. We have hundreds of photos, all of C. V. Folks. Dad's ice cream parlor booth (1/2 of a set) was donated by Lodena and Bob Wilt. They saved it for me for years, during the time I lived in a mobile home that it did not fit into.

On July 12, 1998 we traveled to Mineral Point, WI to view the Pendarvis Historical Home followed by dinner at a restaurant. We scheduled a road trip every spring and fall to somewhere of historical interest. Twelve or more usually went.

Eventually I became the treasurer which I held for seven years. I also planted and took care of the three flower beds in front of the building. My next position was writing the newsletter for several years. Currently I am the secretary for the Society. I enjoyed doing all of it.

The building was built in 1899. It was the village's Town Hall when I was a kid, then a library, and two craft stores in succession. After that we asked the village for it to create a home for the historical society. They agreed and only charged us \$1.00 a year.

For many years a fairly large group came to our once a month meetings. We had bake sales in the spring and fall, and often a summer ice cream social in the pavilion by the Kishwaukee River.

There were many helping hands from our members, who enjoyed working with each other and making a bit of profit from each activity.

On June 11, 1999 several of us traveled to Sycamore, IL to view the Victorian home of Adolphus Brower (1876) and dinner at the Stratford Inn. These old homes were very interesting and each had a docent to make it more educational.

December 12, 1999 our Historical Society sponsored a Holiday Walk for the village residents. It was very successful. We told the history of each of 5 homes as the residents walked up and down State Street (old R.#5). Five of our members acted as docents in these homes. It took a lot of planning by our group, but was worth it to hear all the favorable comments afterwards. Then in October of 2001 we traveled to Galena to view the Ulysses S. Grant home. The rooms and artifacts were very well preserved and enjoyable to see.

December 12, 2001 the Historical Society hosted an Open House in the new Village Hall in Cherry Valley. We held our own Antiques Road Show one year. Many came with their antiques and contributed to it's success. Swan Hackmeister, a friend if Marilyn (Peacock) West appraised antiques.

December 14, 2003 we sponsored another successful Holiday Walk. Pee Wee and Sally Hollembeak hosted a Christmas Dinner for our group every year with such tasty food and dear friends.



The Beckman Mill in South Beloit was another destination. John Larson was a volunteer there and gave us a great tour. Over the years many more trips (usually two a year) were made to more historical homes and locations, along with visiting historical societies in other nearby towns.



Around 2006 our active group was beginning to dwindle due to some passing away, and others becoming to ill to join us anymore. In 2010 we became a link on the Cherry Valley Library's website.... a valuable resource for those that are unable to visit in person.

I really loved being part of our little Historical Society, and enjoyed the camaraderie with the members. Our last three presidents Lyle Wilt, John Larson and Pee Wee Hollembeak were special guys. They loved working with the Society, were very dedicated and had such wonderful memories of Cherry Valley. Oral history is perhaps the most fragile to preserve. I'm sad to say that "All good things must come to an end I guess." As I retire from being an officer on the board, there will be new faces to help keep this work ongoing.

Community School News

For awhile, Cherry Valley grade school had a little newsletter called "The Valley Echo", written primarily by the 7th and 8th graders. The older students published their own separate paper titled "Community School News" -published the third Friday of each month by the students of the Cherry Valley High School. Another article had no title or byline, but I enjoyed the description of the event.

"Cherry Valley is to have the privilege of hearing one of the best glee clubs in the country next Tuesday. when the YMCA College Glee Club of Chicago gives a concert in Oberg Hall under the auspices of the Ladies Aid society. Tickets are now on sale, 50 cents for adults, and a special price of 25 cents for school children. The young men will be entertained in the homes of C.V. people while here. The group contains young men from all over the world, a West Indian Student, a Chinese student and a white man from New Zealand. It is hoped that every able-bodied man, woman and child in Cherry Valley will avail themselves of this unusual opportunity to hear such high class musical talent."


- 1. Petitioned and got the speed limit reduced from 55 mph to 45 mph on Harrison (Bypass 20) and Mill Road intersection.
