


#### The Murphy Clan

Our family moved to Cherry Valley in 1950 to 420 Genoa Road. Our Dad (Bob Murphy) worked in Rockford for the U.S. Post Office as a mail carrier, where he retired as a supervisor. Mom (Lola Murphy) eventually retired as officer in charge at the Cherry Valley Post Office. I was in 10<sup>th</sup> grade, Sally, Mary Dale, and Terry attended Cherry Valley grade school and Tim was a toddler, not yet in school when we moved to the valley. Back then the school districts changed several times. Kathy, Sally and I all graduated from East High, Mary Dale and Terry from Auburn, and Tim from Guilford. All us kids lived at home on Genoa Road until we left to get married.

Cherry Valley United Methodist Church was where we all were married, with the exception of Terry and Sherry. Their wedding was in Rockford. We are all still members of the CV Methodist Church. I married a Valley guy, Bill Gorsuch, and we built our first home on Mill Road. Kathy married Vance Sunberg, and they bought the Farr home on Van Buren St. Sally also married a Cherry Valley guy, Pee Wee Hollembeck, and their home was on Ulster Street. Sally still lives there. Mary Dale bought her home from Don and Dorothy Allen on Mill Rd. Sherry and Terry Murphy bought the Homer and Vera Wilson home on Lawrence St. Tim and Connie settled on Wheeler Rd. in Kirkland.

Our family as grown considerably! Mom and Dad would have had 18 grandchildren, 33 great grandchildren, and 8 great-great grandchildren.

Dad served on the Cherry Valley Village Board for 6 years, and Sally is still a village trustee. Mom was on the C. V. school board in the 50's. Mom and Dad, Pee Wee, and Terry were all Citizens of the Year in Cherry Valley.

Kathy, Sally, Mary Dale, Tim and I are all widowed. Everyone including myself is now retired. Each of us still call Cherry Valley home, even though we now live in Belvidere, Rockford, Cherry Valley and Kirkland.

### Cherry Valley Cemetery

Imagine that you are standing on a tree filled knoll that overlooks the Kishwaukee River just outside of Cherry Valley. Looking around you see the property purchased by Thomas Poulton in 1850. As you look at the headstones, you see this land was used as a burial site even before Thomas purchased it. The earliest headstone is from 1826 for Foster Blackington, then Mary Horton in 1839. The land has had many burials since then, and many of us have relatives resting there. When the flags are placed for our Veterans, you'd be amazed at their numbers. A Cemetery is not to grieve, but to be comforted. One has but to walk among the rows, and know the generations that have been. They ask nothing of us except that which we ask of ourselves, that we care for the God's Acres in which they rest as though it were a sacred trust.

In July of 1905 a petition was sent to the Secretary of State asking to form the Cherry Valley Association. The first Pres. was Fred King, Abram Davis VP, Josephine Slater Sec., and Ray Lee Treas. This group's board of trustees responsibilities have not changed from that day: taking care of the grounds, mowing, raking, removing limbs, dead trees and repair work on monuments. Done originally by members of the board or families of those buried there, in recent years this has needed to be hired.

Many of you don't know how the Cherry Valley Cemetery operates. Because it has come down through a family since the date of its inception, the Village does not own the land, nor contribute to its' upkeep, nor does the County. Therefore, we operate only on the interest from CD's, which has been extremely low.

This excerpt from an editorial in the Rockford Newspaper is as true today as it was in 1958...when originally published. "Perpetual care—the average cemetery has few resources beyond the price of the lot, a part of which is set aside in trust for continuing care. Money willed to a general fund for maintenance and improvement, and gifts from those who hold cherished memories of those buried there, is always hoped for."

It would be greatly appreciated if everyone would donate what they can towards rebuilding the maintenance fund to keep the property in good shape, and not let it go to the state as so many other private cemeteries have over the years.

Unfortunately at this time our cemetery is tied up in legalities, and we are not able to sell lots. We try very hard to keep it looking nice. This is a non profit association, no trustee or officer receives any pay, and we do need your help before the money is gone.
