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Did you know this gentleman standing at the counter of his Cherry Valley hardware store? This picture is Homer Green, a resident in Cherry Valley for 45 years. Many of you may remember that he and his wife, Viola "VI" Kling Green, ran an antique shop located behind their home on S. Cherry Street for many years. Picture (circa 1941) donated by the family of Lodena Wilt).





Homer picked me (Sue Simonson) to tell his story and how he helped shape Cherry Valley's history. This post card fell onto the floor in front of me during a random clean up in the CV Historical Society building. I was intrigued with this picture of the young school children and on the back was a lovely note their teacher, Nellie M. Maxwell, wrote. It was addressed to Homer (1<sup>st</sup> grade). I assumed this picture postcard was of Homer's first grade class in Cherry Valley, but research told me differently.

Our Homer Harry Green, born on June 14, 1909 was the last child born to Arthur Clinton Green (1870-1941) and Cora Alice Robertson Green (1875 – 1956) in Appleton City, St Clare County, Missouri. You are probably wondering what someone from Appleton City has to do with Cherry Valley, Illinois. Me too. The first thing I learned is that this picture was taken in Missouri not Cherry Valley, in fact, he never attended school here. Turns out that his eldest sister, Flora Elizabeth Green Wilt (1898-1985) was living here and Homer, as an adult, came for a visit and ended up staying for the rest of his life.

Homer met and eventually married Viola Kling on October 19, 1937.



Homer was the manager/owner of the Standard Oil service station (east end of State Street) for several years and then the United States Selective Service sent him an invitation (a.k.a. draft notice) to join the US Armed Forces in early August of 1943. From best I can tell during his two years of service, he went to Texas and then to California before shipping out to New Caledonia in the southwestern Pacific. Corporal Homer Green served in World War II until December 1945 when he mustered out through Rockford's Camp Grant.

After the war, Homer and Vi opened their home to Homer's mother, Cora who lived the rest of her life with them. The Greens never had any children, but the reason is not apparent. Later, they owned and ran the little antique shop behind their home for many years. I want to think Vi ran the antique shop and Homer, being good with his hands, tinkered with refurbishing old furniture and repairing electronics. I imagine him as being the Andy Griffith character, Emmett Clark, who ran Emmett's Fix-it shop.

Green 68, Cherry Valley, died Saturday morning at St. Anthony Hospital after a brief illness. .....Surviving are his widow, Viola, one brother, Elmer Green of Appleton City and two sisters Mrs. Flora Wilt –Cherry Valley and Mrs. Blanche Gerken of Montrose, Mo. He was preceded in death by his parents; one brother Alberrt and one sister Flossie Mannen. Funeral services were held today at Witbeck-Wheeler Sabien Funeral Home. The Rev. Ralph Wilson, pastor of the Cherry Valley United Methodist Church officiated. Burial was in the Cherry Valley Cemetery. Pallbearers were Ronald Barton, Homer Shaffer, Herbert Bates, Oral Holt, Stephen Appell and Vernon Wilt.

Homer passed away at the young age of 68 on December 17, 1977. Vi passed away ten years later in 1987. Both are buried in the Cherry Valley Cemetery.

Thank you, Homer Harry Green, for allowing me to show how you helped shape Cherry Valley into the wonderful place it is to live today.

The village of Cherry Valley has always prided itself on hosting community events for its residents throughout the years. Most recently, the Easter candy scramble, family outdoor movie night, youth fishing tournament, street dance, Fourth of July parade and fireworks show, and the Halloween parade are some of the annual events that are planned for the enjoyment of the community. # Village planning party for all

CHERRY VALLEY — When this village throws a party, all the villagers are invited.

Christmas will be no different, Evelyn Brennan of the Cherry Valley Beautiful Committee said Tuesday.

The Christmas party is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Dec. 22.

"It's going to be an oldfashioned type Christmas party," Mrs. Brennan said. Children residents of the village led by the Girl Scouts "and any adult who wants to join in" will first assemble at the village hall and the newly built Bicentennial log cabin.

Next will come a caroling party throughout the village.

"Judy Hager and Donna Reese will be in charge of the carolers," Mrs. Brennan said. "Harry Eckert will accompany them on his guitar and sing."

The carolers will then return to the village hall where a wassailing party will begin. The village board Tuesday "Can you imagine Rockford City Council giving permission for a wassailing party in their council chambers?" Mrs. Brennan asked. "That's what a small town isiall about - being able to do this. Served at the wassail party will, of course, be wassail, Mrs. Brennan said. The name of this apple cider punch means "to your good health" in Anglo-Saxon. There also will be cookies, coffee and hot chocolate.

"Everything will be donated and everything will be homemade by residents of the village," Mrs. Brennan said.



## Santa first in new jail

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CHERRY VALLEY — Cherry Valley has a new jail and jolly ole Santa Claus became the first person to be locked up.

Santa was nabbed by police chief Ralph Truitt Monday night while leaving a village hall Christmas party. Truitt later admitted that Santa's act was staged to commemorate the opening of the new jail.

Santa Claus was played by Mrs. Sheryl Brennan, of Cherry Valley.

A crowd of about 50 persons stormed the police station after Santa was taken into custody. One small child asked with tears in her eyes if Santa would be out in time for Christmas.

"Don't worry." Santa said, "I wired the North Pole for bail money."

A few minutes later. Truitt announced to a cheering crowd, that he was releasing Santa on personal recognizance because of good behavior.



The theme for the Cherry Valley Library's 2022 Scarecrows on Parade was musicals and musicians. The Historical Society chose to depict Rockford resident, Rick Nielson, the leader of the world famous rock band Cheap Trick. One of his iconic checkerboard guitars is displayed at the Rockford Hard Rock Casino and another Swedish flag themed guitar adorns a wall at the Stockholm Inn restaurant. Rich and Donna Riha, Pat Stegemann, Jill Tryggestad and Melynda Mungor assembled the scarecrow which is displayed in front of the Historical Society Museum.


